A few things to consider as you prepare for and summarize your thoughts on the home visit:

- The home check is sometimes the one and only time rescue will meet the prospective home and decide the future of a placement.
- Remember home checks are rarely pass or fail visits, they are more of a visit to help determine how a bulldog would fit into the prospective home and what the bulldog would be expected to be in the home.
- IBR only places in-door pets that are going to be family members.

Other Pets

- While at the home check, as yourself: "Would I leave my own bulldog here and what would I want to see changed in the home before I would leave mine there?"
- Not everyone can be held to our personal standards, but we can hope the come pretty close to how
 each of us would feel.

- Play attention to stairs, the condition of the fence, is there tile in the home, where could they keep the
 dog for the first few weeks while training the dog in the new home.
- Ask the home 'What would they not accept in the care and upkeep of a rescue bulldog'. Explain to them bulldogs are not perfect and the home will be a partner the long term care of a bulldog.
- Ask the home 'What do they like best about the bulldogs and what are their expectations of a rescue bulldog.'
- Do they have other pets... if so, how are those pets... are these pets happy, well socialized, well fed and well mannered? If their current pets are in good care, we can hope that is a sign they will treat a rescue dog as well too.
